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BEHIND THE MIKE

".....We'll have these moments to remember....."

As I looked out upon 18 sets of graceful dancers moving smoothly last Saturday night to the calling of Dick Jones and myself, I couldn't help but recall other Saturday night dances in that same hall some 16 years ago, then a weekly occurrence.

The caller then was a short cherubic-faced gentleman from Newark....Charlie Zintel; one of the most popular callers in Northern New Jersey at that time. He had been calling for the weekly Saturday night dances there at John & Midlred Jacobs' cozy little Hilltop Barn in Bloomfield throughout the war years... in fact, since October 15, 1940. Prior to that, the Swing Billies with Bill Britt as caller had kept the dancers going. Square dancing had been featured since New Year's Eve, 1935. For a little better than a year after that New Year's dancers cavorted upon a cement floor.

In 1948, calling to recorded square dance music was still something of the future. "The Hilltoppers" band backed Charlie in those days. Instruments included fiddle, trumpet, piano, and drums. Fox trots, waltzes, lindy jitterbug, and polka numbers were danced between sets.

The square dancing was generally far from smooth and graceful. In fact, it seemed that the most popular dances were the ones of simplest pattern and longest swings. A full 16-count swing was featured in "Up the Aisle and Separate" to TA-RA-RA-BOOM-DI-AY. "Push Her Away and Watch Her Smile, Step Right Up and Swing Her Awhile," a visiting couple "Jitterbug Square" was always loudly demanded. In fact, of the dances done then, only the Ladies Chain figures of "Just Because" and "My Little Girl" are still heard in our present-day club and class square dance programs. "Forward 6 & Back, Right Lady High, Left Lady Low" was called to CAMP-TOWN RACES; "Roll the Barrel" was done to LUCY LONG; "You Did It So Well, Now Do It Again" echoed to the strains of WHEN THE WORK'S ALL DONE NEXT FALL; and of course, there was the inevitable "Swing her in the center and go six hands around, now kiss the little lady if you dare!" while the band played LISTEN TO THE MOCKING BIRD.

Even the component figures of each square dance little resembled today's versions. Allemande Left was a left elbow swing with the corner. . . . two, three, four, even five times around; Grand Right and Left consisted of a box the gnat—box the flea sequence at full speed around the square, accompanied by much yipping and yelling. Hands were seldom offered as two couples executed Right & Left Thru, and Sashay was a galloping sliding step, usually across the center of the set.

Attendance at these Saturday night dances seldom ran less than 250 per night, and records kept by John & Mildred Jacobs showed occasional highs of better than 400. Those who know the barn incredulously question how so many danced, when we consider the hall comfortably filled with 16 sets. Actually, at no time was the entire crowd dancing at once.

This writer made his first guest calling appearance at Hilltop during the summer of 1948, only weeks after having his own regular series of Friday night dances in the American Legion Post, Sparkill, New York. Jim Flammer, another of the regular weekly dancers at Hilltop 15 years ago, also called there s few months later, and eventually succeeded Charlie as regular caller until the dances were discontinued during the mid-1050's. Another of the present New Jersey callers who danced to Charlie Zintel those Saturday nights was Dick Pasvolsky. Charlie Trojahn, then of Spring Valley and now residing in Hackensack, was another frequent dancer and guest caller.

Most of the old crowd who gathered at the fifty-cent admission rate to swing and stomp their way through the dances have long since died off, moved away, or gone on to other pastimes. I can recall only a few who still make a majority of the affairs held at the barn today.

Yes, these were moments to remember. I can't say I would advocate going back to the wild-rough-house swinging dances of those days. And yet, I can't help but think. . . . what was it that made those dances so popular? Could it just possibly have been the fact that a person who had never square danced in his life could wander in and know enough square dancing to dance comfortably at any of the regular week-end dances held in the Barn?

Progress has been made: rough-house dancing is taboo, complex figures have replaced long hard swings, but the number of participants seems to have dwindled. I wonder. but then, there are always those moments to remember.

HILL TOP SQUARES - The LaRues spent part of the winter vacationing in Florida. There they were joined by Presidents Arnie and Dawn Klook and danced their way back North with a stop at Washington, D. Guests are always welcome. . . as evident in April when the recent graduates of the Association Class in Tenafly attended. They all did very nicely and seemed to enjoy themselves. Merry Squares had a guest caller, Vinnie Caruso, at the end of March. Their annual election of officers will be held in June - at the annual Buffet-Supper Dance to be held at the Schweizers in Wayne.
