

From the desk of Harriette & Sol Koved, NNJSDA Presidents The responsibilities of the presidents' office require that your Association of square dance clubs are truly and properly represented. Therefore, when we do make a public address it should reflect the thoughts of most square dancers — if not all of those in our north New Jersey area. This requirement is particularly applicable when we speak to students at a class session or to the bright new dancers at a graduation. For several years our message has been the same and as we repeat it at this time, some readers will find it to be familiar.

For just a few moments let us dwell on the subject of badges. The forty or more varieties of club badges are expressive of the individuality of the NNJSDA groups - no two alike, each colorful and unique. These pieces of plastic proudly proclaim the wearer to be a club member --- a loyal, active and contributing part of a group that is the cornerstone of square dancing.

Without clubs there would not be square dancing as we know it. People with a common interest rent a hall, work with callers and plan programs. The special spirit generates a club personality reflected in friendliness and personality peculiar to the group. The sum of success is the total of many small parts - the individual members who contribute time and effort reflected in refreshments, decorations, raids and parties. These people are a vital constituent of square dancing and the club badge tells us exactly that.

#### So, this is precisly what we tell the new dancers:

Whether you continue with the club that has provided the lessons or join another better suited to your needs -- belong to a club and wear its badge. Be a contributing member, do not succumb to the simple and easy expedient of wearing a plain name badge - one that tells the world that you have no affiliation, that you take of others and do not reciprocate. Attending dances is not enough of a contribution to make square dancing thrive. Be part of the action and be an active club member.







Only 5 months to go before the 26th National Convention opens in Atlantic City - ready? Start now to mentally & physically prepare for 3 fun-filled days at the Seashore which will offer something to whet every dancers appetite.

Mentally you can start now to plan your day the way you want, as the fantastic Convention Center will offer you an opportunity to dance, relax, eat, shop & attend clinics from 9 am until 11 pm Thursday, Friday & Saturday, June 23,24,25 - 1977.

There will be 45 solid hours of dancing in 10 spacious, accountically soundproof rooms: 6 for squares of club level, mainstream, hothash & challenge: 2 rooms for rounds & 2 for contra & folk dancing. The smallest of these rooms will hold about 75 squares, the main arena 1300 squares and a separate area for teens will allow about 150 squares to dance comfortably. The Convention Committee has spent an additional \$30,000 to insure the rooms will be soundproof & will be using Hilton equipment for your dancing pleasure.

We'll have 80 hours devoted to seminars, sewing clinics, calling/teaching sessions & roundtable discussions. Plans are jelling for beachparties, sight-seeing tours, an ocean fishing trip, shopping sprees & a four hour clambake for grownups & children. Each night a special event will be held in the main arena just prior to the start of the open dancing & on Saturday night there'll be a GRAND MARCH which is a colorful, moving experience.

The best part of the 3 days is that you can plan the day according to what is best for YOU. A program book is available for \$1.25 which lists the time schedules for who is calling where & at what time so therefore if you want to participate in one of the above mentioned outside extras you can still juggle your dance & activity time the way you desire to get as much out of this phenomenon as possible.

Physically you can also get a head start by planning a comfortable summer wardrobe. Gals, why not start now to whip up a couple of matching outfits for you and your guy to wear? How about sewers in a club sharing their talents to get a club costume together? Many clubs and/or States have matched outfits at Convention time & you can easily spot dancers from a given area by their colorful costumes - some clubs even have an outfit for each night - so there's a project to keep one busy these winter doldrum day<sup>1</sup>!! Contact your club president for a list of registered dancers & you might be surprised at the interest in promoting a project to help identify your club, amongst some 20,000 dancers, as an outstanding happy group from a certain area

Another project to please consider at this point would be to help your Association handle the Workers' & Floor Hospitality committments we've made to the 26th National Committee. We will need about 900 combined volunteers - or about 300 responsible dedicated people each day - who can spare an hour or two to help us either in the workers hospitality room or on the floor as spotters. 

#### The Quarterly Movements Report by CALLERIANE EXTEND (THE TAG) for the first quarter - 1977 by Jimmy Davis

The committee selected one experimental basic for this quarter. The present use of Extend the Tag is best described as the ability to move from one ocean wave formation to another wave formation. All dancers in the ocean wave will step thru and form an ocean wave with the couples they are facing. If your extension leaves you facing out, then remain facing out... The action is most common from a wave between two couples as in the formation set up by having the Heads Pass The Ocean. Also used after a fractional Tag The Line figure to extend into a different formation.

CALLER ACCREDITATION - The Callerlab Committee, chaired by Bill Peters of California, has now provided the administrative detail necessary for its implementaion. The procedure: a caller desiring to be accredited, must first seek an application from the Executive Secretary of Callerlab (John Kaltenthaler). The callers then must obtain three acreditors in each of several categories to achieve a total of 20 points... General calling skills (teaching, timing, music, diction, choreography & figure construction, command techniques, programming, etc), Maximum earnable points - 5; Specialty calling skills (One Night stands -1 pt), (Round dancing - 1 pt), (Contra dancing - 1 pt), (Advanced dancing-1 pt); Training & Experience points are awarded based upon the training of the individual as well as the length of time actively calling .... maximum earnable points provide for 1 point for successful completion of an appropriate caller training program and 3 points per year of active calling not to exceed 15 points for experience. The signatures of 3 accreditors are required in each category except the Training category. Currently only CALLERLAB members may act as accreditors and no individual may accredit a caller who has accredited him (her). There will be a small fee. All current continued on page 16

The SQUARE PINCUSHION decorates easily and effectively...



There have been several good ball-point paints on the market in recent years. I can only speak for the ones I've tried. Tri-chem and Vogart, both come in a wide range of colors, are easily applied and are washable.

These paints come in tubes, held vertically to paint, and its as easy as coloring in a coloring book....and that's the key to getting started.

Go to the dime store and look over the variety of coloring books, select one with designs to your liking and they need not be intricate, in fact, simpler ones will be easier for you.

Wash your fabric first to get the sizing out and to preshrink if necessary. Your fabric in a pastel color or white can be laid over the design and lightly traced in regular pencil. Outline each part of the design in the desired color of ball-point paint, then fill in just as you would in a coloring book. Let dry completely, about 48 hours, press from wrong side before laundering.

Experiment on scraps before doing it on your finished garment. Experiment to see how easy it is to blend or add touches of light and dark colors to give the effect of shading. If you can do your painting on the cut pieces of fabric before sewing it is easier. Bear in mind the seam allowances and darts, and also direction of design. If you find it necessary to paint after a garment is completed, under-lay the extra fabric so it doesn't touch the piece you're painting on as it can go through. On completed garments its sometimes easier to do it in sections rather than try to complete in a day.

For designs look around you-wallpaper, other fabrics, magazines, books, children's clothes, pattern books, pictures and many household articles suggest designs you can reproduce. Look around and go to it.....

If the cost of several tubes seems to be too costly, consider a friend going in with you-painting as with other arts is fun when done with others..a painting party and you all share your tubes with each other....



Quite often questions are asked of officers about how the Association raises its monies and how they are spent. Misconceptions and misunderstanding have been perpetuated for years. A clear understanding should be given to all. All monies are raised from only 5 sources...club dues

(which are presently \$5/club per year), summer dances, special dances, and GRAND SQUARE Booster drive and GRAND SQUARE advertising. The last two are used for GRAND SQUARE expenses only.

Where does the money go? The Booster Drive and GRAND SQUARE advertising have the past few years covered the 5 issues - give or take a few dollars. The rest is used for class material - such as diplomas, basic booklets, 100% dangles, freeloaders dangles, National S/D week posters and other promotional expenses; dance expenses - halls, fliers, callers, cuers (all callers and cuers are always paid for their services, unless it is a benefit); administration- delegates meetings, printed materials, communications between officers & clubs, postage, phone calls; and Special Programs such as LUST (our most recent - but in the past underwriting the beginnings of Solitaires, our Single Club; New Callers Classes, etc). Officers get no remumeration of any kind.

To accomplish the above services, profits must be realized from the Association dances. You are asked to support these functions so that your Association can continue to provide the services to you and your clubs. Next time you attend as Association dance remember that part of your admission will help defray the expenses of future activities of your NNJSDA.
