

fort. Please remember that your club need your support throughout the year.






#### **1994 POSTER CONTEST RULES**

- 5. Avoid "localizing" the poster to any one geographic area as it will be used in New Jersey, New York and Pennsylvania.

- 7. All entries **MUST** be received by Friday, May 20, 1994. Judging will be Sunday, May 22, 1994by the NNJSDA Executive Board.
- 8. All entries become the property of the NNJSDA and may be displayed at National and State Square Dance Conventions.
- 9. The winning poster will be reprinted by the NNJSDA and distributed during the Summer Dances for use in promoting classes.
- 10. The winning poster will be featured on the cover of the September issue of Grand Square.
- 11. The winning artist(s) will receive appropriate recognition at an NNJSDA Summer Dance.

ON THE ROAD AGAIN

I write this column as I sit watching a body toning class. Oh, that's going to do a lot of good, right? Well, I've just spent 2 hrs. straight teaching Country Western line dancing to a mob of women at the April Women's Wellness Weekend at the Granite (as a guest of the Women's Health Exchange of S.I. Hospital, working with the YMCA), and they still want more, more, more - so I'm resting up for the next onslaught of dancers. I'm having a lot of fun here.

The traveling season is upon us again, & since many of you are taking off to various parts unknown to dance your way around the world, may I digress from sewing hints this issue & make a few suggestions? I'm finally choosing & packing clothing properly for traveling after all these years. I usually took too much, never wore half of what I carried & always vowed to never do that again. On an average dancers! excursion I find I need: - Dancewear; 1 crush-proof slip, 2 petti pants or jazz briefs, 1 stretch belt the color of your shoes or slip, 2 skirts & 2 blouses (a print & a solid of each) for mixing & matching in one color scheme of wrink-le resistant fabric with no ruffles or "excesses" that would need pressing. Without the slip, this clothing can be worn to a respectable restaurant for dinner. - Footwear; (all the same color) dance heels (which can be worn to the aforementioned dinner place), dance flats (which can double as slip-pers & walking shoes if you don't like sneakers), sneakers (if you'll walk on cement or wet ground a lot), & cowboy boots (if you'll country western dance or stroll on terrain where snakes and/or ticks might be met). - Casual wear; 1 pr. of jeans or slacks, 1 pr. of shorts (if you wear them) & 2 or 3 T-shirts. - Stockings; 2 pr.(rinse & dry 1 pr. while wearing the other.) If you get a run you can buy these "on the road". - Socks; ladies 2 pr., men figure 1 pr. each day plus 2 pr. - P.J.s; 1 pr.(I like lite flannel) -- Underwear; a pr. for each day & 2 pr. for security. If it's a long trip visit a laundromat. — Personal items; "trial size" bottles & tubes of everything. You can always buy more "trial size" stuff "on the road" if you run out, just make sure you start with enough. - Hair dryers, alarm clocks, shavers, etc.; I get the smallest I can find & leave them & all the "trial size" things in my luggage for trips only. - Make-up: at home I keep it in a travel kit. so all I need do is zip it up " remember to pack it. - Outerwear; 1 basic jacket that will go with everything.


As the regular dance season ebbs, we urge you to attend all of the summer dances you are able to and reinforce all the wonderful steps you were taught as well as share good fellowship with other

## "PROPER" SQUARE DANCE ATTIRE (or Fun vs. Finery) by Dick Mazziotti, Caller/Teacher

Even considering the just graduated dancer, can any of you factually pursue a little walk through the innermost regions of your brain and remember your <u>first</u> impression of square dancers? Even those of us who are not yet among the Memory Disadvantaged now have a hard time bringing back the shock, the smirks, the utter utterness of that first look at a bunch of grown people in those clothes!

Now I can just hear a fair portion of the square dance world's indignation heating up when I question such a square dance shibboleth as "proper square dance attire." Please don't write me nasty letters or tell my friends or enemies what you really think of me until you have read the rest of this column. Then write the nasty letters.

Here's the thing. "Proper Square Dance Attire" in its proper place is a wonderful thing to behold. The rhythmic rise and fall of skirt edges, the flash and glitter of badges and dangles, and the sheen of lame shirts and crinolines can bring tears of joy to the eyes of the caller, especially when the dancers choose to do some of the calls he or she is calling. When we are among other dancers, as at club dances, festivals, weekends, conventions, etc., there is nothing nicer than seeing and being among those wearing square dance attire in all its fulsomeness.

But to the uninitiated, friendliness, fun and companionship don't fare well on the visibility scale when confronted with short skirts showing (how shall I put this?) gravitationally disadvantaged legs, or in the face of spring-loaded towels dangling freely below overhanging paunches. Uh oh! I hear the entire square dance world gathering its collective ire. Well, read on.

I suggest that there are times when the full panoply may not be quite the cat's meow. For example, at an open house dance where we try to coerce

newcomers into our wonderful wacky world, especially, dare I say it, some younger people; or, perhaps at a public demonstration where recruitment of new dancers enters the realm of possibility. Are we not, maybe, frightening off potential dancers, especially those of the younger persuasions, when they are suddenly confronted with the shock value of a couple in full regalia who says, "Oh yes, we'd really like you to join us." (...and dress like that??? You gotta be kidding!!!)

It has been postulated that much of the success of the Western Dance movement has to do with the fact that the dancers can wear "cool" clothes. We square dancers are, on the other hand, forcing people to notice that we still dress like the fifties when we were in our twenties even though we are in our fifties (the math isn't accurate, but the idea is).

A general rule of social behavior says that up to age 10 or so, we try desperately to look and act like our elders. From 10 to about 18 or 20, we try to look like our friends. From 20 or so on up, we have tendencies to want to look like those younger than we are. It also says that if we keep on dressing like square dancers dressed in 1950, but put those clothes on bodies only the AARP can love, we might be said to look silly at times. Looking silly among ourselves can be part of our fun. Looking silly to those we are trying to recruit can be damaging to our social health.

Would it be such a terrible crime for us to dress in prairie skirts (the ladies) and western shirts without assorted attachments (the men) when doing a demo in public or at a recruitment open house dance? Might it not be a good idea to let the fresh young minds of our prospective dancers find out about the FUN before we dazzle them with the FINERY? I would be interested in hearing from any clubs that try this or have tried this as a policy.

And before the more irate among you write letters, go back and read paragraph #3.



The following article will help those that did not know her to understand what a treasure she was to the square dance community, and to those who knew her, danced with her, and called her friend, this article will help them remember those wonderful years they spent together. Many thanks to Peg & Doc Tirrell for sending us this expressive picture of a beautiful, caring, delightful person, whom we had the pleasure of knowing for all too short a time...

#### LORRAINE MOONEY

We sit here staring at a birthday card we had saved for Lorraine's March birthday. And wonder, "How does one get mail to heaven?"


Newer dancers in the northern NJ area may not have had the pleasure of her company and friendship as Lorraine & Frank retired from the activity a number of years ago, but their legacy lives on. Discovering square dancing in '67, they quickly became involved wholeheartedly in spreading its warmth, fun and friendliness, not only in the western regions of NJ but everywhere they went. Founders and former officers of Sussex Spinners, they were one of the NNJSDA's original Freeloaders, earning their Patron's Badge in record time, followed by their first Century Badge. Their motto was, "If you enjoy the activity, don't be a taker, become involved, be a <u>do-er</u>." And they did, serving as 2nd, 3rd and 1st VPs before being elected NNJSDA Presidents in 1973.

So many memories come flooding back: summer Thanksgiving dinner Executive Board meetings at their home; the first Mini-Festival in '74; the beginning of L.U.S.T.; and the enthusiasm and encouragement they generated in support of the 26th National Square Dance Convention held in Atlantic City in '77. During their two years as Presidents, the NNJSDA sponsored a class for 13 aspiring callers and the Callers' Council of New Jersey was formed; the NNJSDA revamped the Square Dance Basic Figures Booklet given to all class members (this was before Callerlab developed their Programs); and the Constitution and ByLaws were updated. All this and they still devoted much time to their family of four teenagers and their church.

While Frank was the spokesman, it was Lorraine who wrote their upbeat messages for **Grand Square**. Never a woman of few words. Lorraine's messages repeated the same theme in many different ways, "The activity is as much fun as you make it; get involved; many hands make light work; the more you put into this 'tremendous couple activity,' the more you and everyone else will benefit from it. Enjoy, enjoy, enjoy!!!" Cooperation and communication was their byline.

When the 26th NSDC was awarded to the Delaware Valley Federation, it was natural that the Mooneys should become the NNJSDA Liaisons and Hospitality Chairmen. As Lorraine said, "What else with so many hospitable square dancers in the NNJSDA." Once again Lorraine wrote volumes in **Grand Square** encouraging all to become involved in the largest square dance event on the East Coast in years. They helped sell early-bird certificates and cookbooks. They formed a committee to trace patterns, cut material and sold do-it-yourself convention "costume" kits for NNJSDA dancers to sew and wear to publicize the 26th NSDC. They chaired and mother-henned the group who were dancing the special demo at the 25th NSDC in California that kicked off the Atlantic City Convention. They masterminded a most successful Booster

Ball to raise moneys for the 26th NSDC. Thanks to their leadership, northern NJ provided over a 1,000 dancers to help with hospitality needs for this 3-day Convention, as well as encouraging many other area dancers to donate their expertise and assistance in a variety of ways.

When the 26th NSDC was over, the General Chairmen, Dorothy & Steve Musial, graciously donated the Booster Ball moneys back to northern NJ and the Mooneys were asked to chair the NNJSDA "Use of Excess Funds" Committee for the disposition of this unexpected windfall. The Committee recommended setting aside funds to establish an Emergency Loan Committee for financially depressed clubs in need of temporary aid. The Committee also suggested donating \$1,000 over the next four years, along with the proceeds from one Association special dance during this period, to the New Jersey Association for Retarded Citizens. Both suggestions were accepted by the NNJSDA delegates.

Time marches on, new dancers come and share their expertise for a period of time, put their mark on the activity, and then move on. But friendships formed during these times last on, and on, and on. As a Girl Scout song says, "Make new friends, but keep the old. Some are silver and others are gold." In Olympic terms, Lorraine was GOLD.



# RULES FOR SQUARE DANCES 100 YEARS AGO

by Bob March, New England Caller

- 1. Admittance \$.50, refreshments included.
- 2. The music is to consist of a fiddle, a pipe or tabor, a hurdy gurdy. No chorus is to be sung until the dancing is over.
- 3. No lady to dance in black stockings, nor have her elbows bare.
- 4. Every lady to come with a handkerchief with name marked.
- 5. To prevent spitting, no gentlemen will chew tobacco or smoke.
- 6. No gentleman will dance in a great coat unless his under one be torn.
- No lady will dress her hair in tallow candle nor must she have a bunch of hair sticking up top of her head.
- 8. Leather small clothes except newly washed are forbidden, as they might soil the ladies' gowns. To prevent tearing of the planking, no gentlemen will dance in nailed shoes or boots.
- 9. No whispering to be allowed. If anyone shall be found to make insidious remarks about anyone's dancing, he or she shall be put out of the room.
- 10. No gentleman will appear with a cravat that has been worn more than a week or a fortnight.
- 11. No scissors or gimlets are to be brought either by ladies or gentlemen unless their pockets are whole.
- 12. Long beards are forbidden, as they would be very disagreeable if a gentleman should happen to put his cheek beside a lady's.
- 13. Those ladies who have not white stockings and black morocco shoes will not be admitted under any pretense whatever. Two old ladies to examine all who enter. *Continued on page 50*


- 14. No lady must appear with a veil on even if it be turned aside, as the gentleman will not have an opportunity of looking at her face distinct.
- 15. No gentleman must squeeze his partner's hand, nor look earnestly upon her; and furthermore he must not pick up her handkerchief, provided it were to fall. The first denotes he loves her, the second he wishes to kiss her and the last that she makes a sign for both.
- 16. For distinction sake, the master of ceremonies is to wear a red coat, buff small clothes, black stockings, green shoes and a furtout.

So wipe off your chin, pull down your vest, dance with the girls that you love best.

Editors' Note: The above article appeared in the Spring '77 issue of <u>Mike and</u> <u>Monitor</u>, a square dance magazine for the Washington, DC area. It's interesting to note that even 100 years ago, there were strictly enforced rules regarding the correct shoes to wear to dances. SQUARE DANCE - AMERICAN FOLK DANCE OF THE STATES Legislators in 1993 plagued efforts in some states, called square dance bills frivolous in other states, and others were indicted on bribery charges. Colorado dancers, with help from their legislators, proved the ACLU wrong.

This year has gotten off to a roaring start with Delaware's bill already signed. Utah, South Carolina, and Maryland all have had their bills passed by the legislators and are awaiting the governors' signatures.

With the addition of Utah, South Carolina and Maryland, 42% of the states have square dancing as their American Folk Dance (AFD): Oregon, Washington, Tennessee, Alabama, New Jersey, Florida, West Virginia, Oklahoma, California, Idaho, Massachusetts, Illinois, Arkansas, Virginia, Montana, and against all odds, legislation was approved in Texas, Colorado, and Delaware. When more states approve the AFD, we will go to Washington, DC for national legislation making the "square dance," and all it's allied dance forms, the American Folk Dance of the U.S.A., in perpetuity. This campaign is spearheaded by Frank & Helen Cavanaugh, National Chairmen of the Legacy Committee of the American Folk Dance of the States, 20 Wooton Drive, Southampton, NJ 08088; 609-859-1937.


A dancer survey was recently mailed to organization leaders, editors, and dancers. Although mentioned as a coordinating participant, Callerlab was not consulted, informed or involved in the formation of this survey. This is a very general survey, to be answered by a show of hands. Callerlab is concerned and questions how accurately it will

reflect the dancer's opinions. The results can vary depending on how it is presented and by whom.

Callerlab is very much in favor of dancer surveys. Legacy has done a fine job in this area for many years. We realized that much effort has gone into the United Square Dancers of America project, but find it unfortunate that the format of this questionnaire and the methods of presentation were not determined by a joint effort of the national organizations involved, and market research professionals. Survey accuracy can only be assured when professionally accepted methods of design, distribution, tabulation, and analysis are followed.

It is our hope that all national organizations will continue to work together for the promotion and betterment of square dancing. Open lines of communication, written goals, and a mutually agreed upon action plan are essential to prevent fractionalization of the activity and duplication of our efforts. So much can be accomplished by working together.

The Mainstream Emphasis Call is **Pass to the Center.** The Plus Emphasis Call is **3/4 Tag the Line.** The Plus Quarterly Selection Committee voted to drop **Transfer the Column** and <u>not</u> to select a new Plus Quarterly for the period of March 1, 1994 to July 1, 1994. The only current Plus Quarterly Selection is **Connect the Diamond**.

The Callerlab office received the following letter from a concerned leader in the square dance activity. We certainly agree with his viewpoint and would appreciate your making it available to dancers and callers through your publication...

"It disturbs me to hear a square dancer say, "I'm just a Mainstream dancer." or round dancers say, "we only dance Phase II and some Phase III." Or a caller say, "I just call Mainstream." The words "just" and "only" seem to carry a connotation of apology - like, "Gee, I'm sorry, but I'm not very good because I just dance Mainstream."

There is no reason for anyone to apologize for the particular program of dancing he or she decides to participate in and enjoys, especially Mainstream squares and Phase II rounds. After all, those programs are the basis of all of our dance programs. Although there may be a few dancers who would want us to believe they came into this world as accomplished "upper level" (note the quotation marks) dancers, I have not met any in my many years of dancing/calling/cueing. I suggest that we dance for the pleasure it gives us. That pleasure comes from many different aspects of a dance program.

For some, the sociability and friendliness is more important than the steps. For others, it is the music that gives them pleasure. For still others, it is the challenge of executing more complex steps and figures. It obviously is inappropriate to say that one group has the only answer or is better than another group. The bottom line is to enjoy the program you have chosen and learn to do it well. Studies of human nature tell us that people enjoy most that which they do well.

There is no law that says one <u>must</u> move "up." Unfortunately, there are those who still think in terms of levels and equate higher numbers with higher quality. That is not how it is. There are many dancers who dance Mainstream and/or Phase II and do so with good executive and styling, who can be considered better dancers than some who fake at Advanced and/or Phase V and VI. As an old singing call suggested, "Do What You Do Well" And ENJOY!"
