## GABE DELL'ANGELO

It is with great sadness that we report the death of Gabe Dell'Angelo on Sunday, December 24, 1995. Gabe died at home with his wife, Sila, at his side after a valiant battle with cancer.

Gabe \& Sila were Presidents of the NNJSDA from 1981. 1983, and served on the Board for more than 10 years in various roles includining, Treasurers, 3rd Vice Presidents, 1st Vice Presidents, and Advisors. They were also active members of Staten Square Set and served as Presidents from 1976-1977. These facts hardly tell the story behind a couple who loved square dancing, carried that love with them everywhere, and gave it freely to everyone.

Always great supporters of the NNJSDA, they regularly attended all NNJSDA functions, and every year the new graduates had the pleasure of dancing with them nearly all summer long. A staunch champion of all new dancers, Gabe \& Sila encouraged students to continue dancing, and welcomed any and all into their square.

They served on committees for both the Atlantic City National Convention in 1977 and the Baltimore National Convention in 1984. Staten Square Set recognized their contributions to square dancing when they were awarded the Lucarini Award, named after Gene \& Grace Lucarini, also former NNJSDA Presidents. To be eligible for the Lucarini Award, you had to be in a leadership role for a minimum of ten years.

Never one to rest on their laurels, they remained active and vital members of Staten Square Set, chairing the anniversary dances, installation dinners, and nominating committees. They were awarded the Blue Jay for service to Staten Square Set. Gabe \& Sila were regular visitors at all the other Staten Island clubs and continued to be angels at RIOS classes.

As green students, Charlie and I were encouraged by Gabe \& Sila even though we would not be joining their club after graduation. They took us under their wings and became our mentors. We have sought their counsel many times over these past 10 years. When asked to join the Executive Board of the NNJSDA just a year after graduation, they spent many hours helping us make our decision. When we accepted editorship of Grand Square, they offered to help us in way they could.

His hundreds of friends will miss him terribly, especially that impish smile and that special gleam in his eye when he was about to reduce everyone in the square to laughter. He was one of the best advertisements square dancing ever had. He wore that love on his sleeve for all to see. Our loss is heaven's gain. Gabe has been an angel for many years, but now he truly has his wings.

## LETTERS TO THE EDITORS . . .

The recent rash of letters pointing fingers or complaining about the rise and fall of dancing, clubs and/or dress leads me to add my comments. In the recent issue of National Voter an article entitled "Bowling Alone" the point is made that Americans are no longer joining groups to actively participate. Our direct engagement in politics, civic organizations such as the Red Cross, PTAs, or LWVs, union membership, and even attendance at church has dropped signiticantly. People are disenchanted with organizations even though they embrace the philosophy. There are many new associations which are vital and growing such as the environmental watchdog groups or retired citizens protecting Medicare, but these memberships are supported by money and emotions, not by regular attendance. The point of the article is that even in a recreation such as "bowling," league participation is way down and individuals who go bowling sporadically for a causal night out with friends is up.

Does this sound like square dancing? People want to "try" square dancing for a while but not to join a club; people want to "try" a festival or a weekend but not travel very far. Of course there are exceptions. The Mini-Festival was very well attended with great traveling callers, but what about the home clubs? In the main, people are doing their own individual thing without taking the responsibility of active group membership. In conclusion, it is not just square dancing that is suffering; there is a whole nationwide pattern.

I am not offering this as an alibi, but as a reason. Now my hope is that we all take a look at what we are doing. Let us help CLUBS, join, promote, and enjoy being an active participant of a group and counteract this national tendency to do our own thing.

Whenever a club folds, it is usually because it is no longer financially able to continue. Bottom line is that the income is no longer enough to balance expenses. Typically, declining numbers of attendees and increasing costs do not make for a happy ending. I would like to address two of the issues (there are obviously more) which contribute to this dilemma, the cost of admission to the dance, and the cost of the callers/cuers.

First, the cost of admission. I went through a Grand Square from 1968 and found the average cost for advertised dances was $\$ 1.50$ per person. In the September 1995 issue of Grand Square the average cost per person was $\$ 3.25$, an increase of $117 \%$. How does that compare with other costs over the same period. Cars: $\$ 4,000$ to $\$ 12,000$, up $200 \%$; houses: $\$ 25,000$ to $\$ 150,000$, up $500 \%$; movies: $\$ 1.00$ to $\$ 6.50$, up $550 \%$; gasoline: $\$ 0.30$ (per gal.) to $\$ 1.30$, up $333 \%$; bowling: $\$ .33$ (per game) to $\$ 1.50$, up $355 \%$. Please note that these figures are per my recollections and do not reflect extensive research. It would appear that the cost of a dance has not kept pace.

Also, what are you getting for your $\$ 3.25$ per person? Typically, you are getting two and one-half hours of entertainment by a licensed professional, the social interaction that a dance atmosphere created, and refreshments. All this for about $\$ 1.30$ per hour. Go watch a movie for two and one-half hours and it will cost you $\$ 2.60$ per hour and you don't get refreshments.

A large part of the appeal of square dancing has always been its relative low cost. I think this should still be one of our goals, but I think that we have to be realistic with our pricing. Charging $\$ 4$ or $\$ 5$ per person for a dance is not unrealistic. Will this cause fewer clubs to fold? No, oniy increased attendance

"WOW - WHAT A GREAT NEW BASIC"


Tired of elastic sleeves that pull up each time you swing? Tina Petroulas of Rutgers' Promenaders called to our attention a great sleeve she found in Lee McCormick's Square Dance Designs (p. 39). Since Tina has some experience with it, I will paraphrase both she and Lee. Lee calls it "free-and-easy and dressy", which it certainly is

Look through your street dress patterns and find a regular short sleeve. It should be 3 " larger around the bottom than your upper arm measurement at the fullest point, and the bottom should fall about 3-4" above the elbow (the finished oversleeve will be about $3^{\prime \prime}$ longer.) Select a pattern that has only a few gathers at the shoulder. This will be the lining pattern

To make an oversleeve pattern, trace the lining onto newspaper; draw lines $3^{\prime \prime}$ from both underarm seamlines and curve the bottom down to 5" (fig \#1.) The underarm seam of the oversleeve should be 3 " longer than the lining.
"Puff" is determined by the oversleeve cap: the higher the top
 of the sleeve cap is raised, the puffier it will be. The minimum added height is $3^{\prime \prime}$. Lastly, on the original pattern measure from the notches to the underarm seamline at the front and back, and mark them in the same positions on the overseleeve. Mark the center top and bottom of both patterns.

The lining can be made out of any lightweight fabric, especially if the fashion fabric is either heavy or expensive. Then apply trim if you like; add eyelet, lace, or whatever trim matches your skirt. Remember that the bottom of the oversleeve will fold up several inches inside.


Run gathering stitches close to the bottom edge of the oversleeve. Matching center notches with right sides facing, sew the two bottom edges together (fig \#2.)


Open out, re-fold with right sides together, and sew the full length of the underarm seam (fig \#3.) Run gathering rows around the top of the oversleeve and, with wrong sides together, baste it to the lining, matching notches and underarm seams. With only a little easing, the sleeve will fit into the armseye. Finish the garment as usual.

Tina comments that you may need a pocket in the skirt that goes with this top--there is no elastic to hold a tissue!! She also passed on some advice she picked up from professional pattern drafter Fan Burris at a recent convention: If the underarm of a bodice is raised by about $1 "$, the waistline will pull up less when the arms are raised. She says it takes a little getting used to, because it fits closer under the arm than we are used to in street clothes, but is very comfortable when dancing

On another subject: When asked about sergers, I always say to look for differential feed, 4 threads, and easy width and tension controls; that should cost \$3-400, and anything else is a nice extra. I never thought to mention knife blades, because that is how I define a serger: an overlock that trims as it sews. Then I saw a "serger" for \$70 wow!! So I took a closer look: three threads--but no knife blades. After you trim the seam to $3 / \mathrm{s}^{\prime \prime}$, it uses an edge guide to sew along the edge. How does that differ from what most sewing machines can do? The sewing machine does it as well, and only needs 2 threads instead of 3 . This one will be a collectable some day.

## ETIQUETTE, THE UNMENTIONABLE

by Dick Mazziotti, Caller/Teacher
New Dancers! Welcome to the wonderful, wacky world of square dancing. This column is only for you new dancers. Many more experienced dancers are forbidden by their religion or their doctor from reading this column.

In December, you are all invited to start escaping from classes to join dancers at "student" or "class-level" dances. Here are some of the things concerning those dances that your class was told while you were in the bathroom!

As soon as the music starts, it is time for you to start. Grab your partner and square up in the first available open square. In order to avoid familial fisticuffs, now is the time to work out with your partner which one of you gives in when you each square up in two different squares!

Note also that at your home club, you and your other club dancers have an obligation to square up with visitors to make them welcome and fill out the squares.

As any instructor or mental health professional will tell you, avoid dancing all night with the same people. Following this advice will soon have you dancing better and you'll not get a reputation as a dance snob. For all dancers, one of the delights of square dancing is the new friends you make. I urge you to get into as many different squares as possible. Try it . . . you'll like it . . . and become a better dancer.

It's the Law! If there is an open spot in a square that's forming, it is open to everyone on the floor. There is no such thing as, "You can't dance here. We already have a square." You don't have a square until all four positions are filled. Refusing someone a position in your square because you are saving it

for someone else will earn you special mention in this column and dirty looks from Laurie. If a special tip is pre-announced, like a hot hash or a Plus tip at a Mainstream dance, then, and only then, if you have a group that would like to try it together, can you walk onto the floor as a square. Otherwise, smile and dance the best you can in every square you're in.

As we get older, we get more and more used to our own habits. . . and aromas. A shower before a dance, use of your favorite deodorant, and clean fresh clothes go without saying-so I won't even mention it.

For women who wear short skirts, and men who wear short shorts, pettipants are a must. There are actually one or two dancers who are known for flashing their tushes to all and sundry. They would dress more appropriately if they know how much they are giggled at.

Once in a square, of course, nothing short of a national emergency of illness is reason to leave it until the tip is over.

Once the music starts, listen closely to the caller and try to do all the calls . . . in the order they are called. There are very few optional calls in square dancing. One aid to continued success in this area is the practice of "closification." Closification (from the Latin: clositus, closificare) means keeping the square tight and small so excursions are limited. At caller's schools we learn the formula: One part nervous $=3$ steps declosification . . . leading to farapartism and, ultimately, break-downitis.

Having had you labor this far, most all of the above can be summed by repeating our motto here at camp: SMILE, HAVE FUN, ENJOY! Happy dancing new dancers. We look forward to seeing you on the dance floor.

The Northern New Jersey Round Dance Leaders Council asked me to write an article on why I became a round dance cuer (hoping to attract others to do the same). That's easy. Back in 1978, Rutgers Promenaders wanted to learn some round dances, Betsy had calling equipment, and no one else in the club knew how to round dance. Viola, instant cuer!

Rather than talk about why I started, I would like to talk about why I continue. Is it a lot of work? Yes. Do I make a lot of money? No. Do I make some extra money? Yes. Do I enjoy doing it? Most of the time. Is it rewarding? Yes! Does it feed my ego? Yes.

If you look at the above paragraph, you will see that most of the responses are yes. The one negative response only refers to the lots of money question. Bottom line? I'm having a great time. I love music of all types; I love performing; and I love teaching. Cueing offers me a chance to experience all of these (and get paid to do it). I often receive favorable comments on my music selections. In all honesty, I choose records because I love working with them. People ask me how I can cue with such enthusiasm (and animation) when there might only be 3 or 4 couples on the floor. Two reasons. The first is that even if there is only one couple, they have paid for and deserve my best performance. The second is that I am performing for myself. I am having a blast. It's kind of like singing and dancing (or playing air guitar) to the radio when you are all alone. I choose music that gets me pumped up, and then give it my best shot. I am doing something that is giving me enjoyment. If the response from the floor (large or small crowd)

is favorable, then the enjoyment becomes satisfaction. Compliments are icing on the cake.

Are there any down side to cueing? Of course. Sometimes I will really like a dance, but most of the responses are, "Use that record for a coaster." Or, sometimes I'll spend a whole night teaching a figure, and the next week it's as if I only dreamed that I taught that figure. Occasionally, I'll have a bad night and foul up every other dance. I'm constantly buying new records (anybody want to buy several hundred slightly used records?). But the up side far outweighs the down side.

To sum why I keep cueing, I will relate what another cuer told me several years ago. This person said that they never thought of being a cuer until they say how much fun I appeared to be having.



## PARADIGMS IN OUR SQUARE DANCE ACTIVITY

Legacy, the International Assembly of "Trustees" of the Square Dance Activity, in conjunction with the National Square Dance Convention, presented two onehour sessions each day at the June NSDC in Birmingham, AL. A number Legacy trustees served as moderators and panelists at these daily sessions.

Much has been said and written about the changes that have been, and are, occurring within the square dance activity. Using the quote that "Dance, to survive, cannot remain unchanged, and like any living thing, it must either develop or disappear," the first session concentrated on why the picture has changed, and the need to look beyond certain stereotyped ideas or boundaries that are possibly keeping some positive changes from being made. It was noted that modern technology has made major changes in callers' and cuers' equipment, as well as aid for the hearing impaired dancer. Also noted was how the dress code has been modified to include prairie skirts.

A lively but thoughtful and positive discussion occurred as the attendees began to reflect on current practices. Suggested were some brand new approaches to making the square dance activity more marketable, new methods of recruitment with different approaches to conducting classes. They also touched upon different positive approaches they thought the National Executive Committee of the NSDC should try, and ways in which the major organizations could work together. As the group left, all were given a "pair of dimes" to remind them that what seems impossible today could be done tomorrow to enhance the activity and lead us into the 21st century.

The second hour dealt with the topic, "Planning A Year of FUN-filled

Activities." This session enlarged upon a quote from Sigmund Freud that, "Every human being needs some positive things to look forward to." Reminding all that when events are scheduled and planned with lots of lead time, there is a much better chance that they will be presented well and enjoyed by both dancers AND planners, the moderator and panelists proceeded to discuss the three-page hand-out outlining 18 months of fun-filled activities. Twelve points were offered for the planning of every successful activity. Several times during the audience participation periods, the additional successful ideas and activities described by the attendees came faster than the pen could record.

All agreed that setting and attitude, along with the planning, go a long way to making a good time. Also stressed was the importance of being super-friendly, and really meaning it. Having new members work along with a "seasoned" couple on a fun activity was mentioned as one way to ease new members into becoming actively involved. When the hour was over, participants continued their sharing of ideas in the hallways.

## SINGLES IN A COUPLE ACTIVITY

This topic provided a most lively and informative session. A large number of couples, as well as singles, gathered to share experiences and focus on how to accept everybody in our activity. Although the plan was to delve into singles clubs here and abroad, family clubs and "mixed" clubs who accept both single and couple members, the discussion quickly broadened to include the problems of divorced and widowed dancers, youth and young adults who want to dance, gay and lesbian dancers, and couples where only one member was able to dance.

Although the word "solo" was suggested for those without a partner, many felt

- Student newsletters
- Dance-around programs
- Get well plans for ailing clubs, organizations, etc.
- Other, as the need arises
- Proposals should be in the form of a "business plan." That means a series of tasks, from conception, costing, tentative rental and professional agreements, to publicity to payback, with broken-down costs, returns and a time-line for each task. There is no better way to make people think things through, and gives them small goals with a short time frame.
- Grants should be disbursed according to each individual task's time frame (not all at one). Reports should be quarterly to the Committee, providing the opportunity for review and any action deemed necessary.

- Any member of any member organization is eligible to apply to the Committee.
- The Committee must guard against the possibility of using the mechanism to make a big profit. However, reinvestment of good return on capital invested could be a subsequent proposal.
- Some proposals, e.g., student newsletters and dance-around programs, are intended to pay back benefits, not funds.
- It is possible that other proposals, such as get-well plans, although designed to pay back funds, may never actually do so.
- The opportunity to make such proposals should be widely publicized.

the solo ribbon was discriminatory. While singles halls are appreciated, the question was asked why they are usually placed in a far away location. Another question was asked why "hitching post" areas are usually in a remote area of the hall, not near the entrance. Also, if there is a singles hospitality room, could it be nearer the entrance?

Participants told of dancing as solos in Europe and Australia, where they had not experienced the problems encountered in the United States. It was pointed out that the singles problem is not just confined to the square dance activity, but can be found elsewhere, in stores, restaurants, and even churches. By making the square dance world aware of the problem, it can be reduced in our activity. Tolerance is the word, always remembering one panelist's reminder that all couples are just a heartbeat away from being single.

Applying truth in advertising was strongly suggested as being needed. Clubs need to be truthful about partners for single neophytes to the activity. There is also a need to stop selling square dancing as a way to meet a mate. Some come just to dance.

With the dancers in the activity growing older, some far-sighted members are working to encourage youth and younger adults to join square dancing. Most attendees agreed that if the activity is to prosper and grow into the next century, this must be encouraged.

The hour went by all too quickly, with many positive suggestions and a request to convene again next year to come up with positive actions to recommend to Legacy and those who are responsible for conducting conventions. will do that, but perhaps with a little more money in the treasury, callers/cuers who will attract a better attendance can be hired.

Which brings us to the topic of caller/cuer fees. In the late ' 60 s and early ' 70 s, good, experienced callers from the area (visiting traveling callers not included) were charging $\$ 45-\$ 75$ for a typical square dance. Today those same callers are charging $\$ 75-\$ 135$ for the same dances. For argument sake, let's say a $100 \%$ increase. This is below the cost of dance fee increases and way below typical wage increases for the same period (minimum wage from $\$ 1.50$ to $\$ 5.50$ per hour, up $267 \%$ ). A DJ, who does nothing but play records at weddings and parties, is charging $\$ 300$ to $\$ 500$ for the same amount of time. Also, if you stay at a job for a long time, improve your skills, and become more proficient at your trade, don't you expect to be compensated accordingly with raises?

If a particular caller is out of your budget range, don't hire him/her! However, before you write them off, talk to them. You will be surprised how many of them (not all) are willing to work with (percentages, per person, different date to coincide with other plans). After all, the more clubs that fold, the less opportunity there is for them to earn their money.

This article does not offer any easy solutions to keeping the clubs afloat. Hopefully, it has cleared up some misconceptions and will open the door for some meaningful dialogue (perhaps fact-finding committee or L.U.S.T. topic) so that our activity will remain an integral part of New Jersey's recreation picture.
