


You are reading *Grand Square*, the Official Publication of the Northern New Jersey Square Dancers Association (NNJSDA).

What is the NNJSDA?

It is an organization of dancers who belong to member clubs. These clubs appoint Delegates, who attend 3 meetings a dance season, usually the 3rd Sunday in

September and January, and the 1st Sunday in May. Anyone may attend a meeting, but only Delegates can vote. Each club has one vote. Every spring, the Delegates elect officers for the coming dance season.

What area is covered by the NNJSDA?

NNJSDA's area begins in the south with Mercer County (Princeton Squares), and goes north all the way to Rockland County in New York State (Rockytops and Rockland Promenaders). In the east, the area begins in Brooklyn (Al'e'Mo Squares and Kings Squares) and continues west to eastern Pennsylvania's Pike and Monroe Counties (Leisure Squares and Dingman Dancers).

How do I become a member of the NNJSDA?

You automatically become a member when you join a member club. There are currently 35 member clubs.

What does the NNJSDA do for you?

1. Publishes *Grand Square* five (5) times a year, which prints club and Association news, a dance calendar, regular and guest columnists, as well as information on the many other facets of the square dance activity. Look for copies at your club.

2. Provides insurance for the dances and classes of member clubs (exception: New York clubs).

B. Holds a special Summer Mainstream Dance Program for new graduates

(see page 6 for schedule).

4. Has a Freeloader Program for new dancers, which is earned by attending 5 of the 7 NNJSDA Summer Dances. The Freeloader entitles you to attend 3 Association Dances FREE during the next year. A blank Freeloader card is in your graduation packet. Have it signed by the NNJSDA Treasurer at every Summer Dance you attend.

 Has a Patron's Award for visiting 26 member clubs on their regular dance night. A blank Patron's card is in your graduation packet. When you visit a member club, have their treasurer or president sign and date the card.

- 6. Has a *One Square is Fair* Award (presented twice a year) to member clubs who have at least one square in attendance at Association Specials and Summer Dances.
- 7. Holds Special Plus Dance Programs on the 5th Fridays or 5th Saturdays of the dance season, usually with national callers and cuers.
- Holds a Mini-Festival, featuring Mainstream through Challenge dancing, every November for a full day of dancing. Next Mini-Festival is November 10, 1996.
- 9. Sponsors a biennial leadership program, *The Gathering*, in even numbered years. The next *Gathering* is scheduled for October 6, 1996.

0. The Association makes available instruction booklets for Mainstream and

Plus classes and diplomas for graduation.

- 11. Assembles special packets of information for new graduates that are presented at graduation by an Association Officer. The Association also awards a special dangle for perfect attendance at classes.
- 12. The Association provides Dance Clearance, through the Recording Secretary, of all club dances and specials to prevent conflicts.
- 13. Sponsors a **Poster Contest** (see page 9) every year to foster interest in square dancing, and distributes publicity packets.
- 14. Provides a forum for discussion and dissemination of flyers at the Delegates

Meetings.

15. Has a NJ State Outfit Chairman, who has the patterns and fabrics for the green and white NJ State Outfit (see page 7). This outfit is worn at National Square Dance Conventions for the parade of states as well as other special occasions when the dancer wishes to be identified from NJ.

"STATE OUTFIT" -- WHAT IS IT, AND WHY DO I CARE?

Square dance conventions and other gatherings usually hold a Parade of States or a Grand March, during which the dancers from each state march together. Frequently the dancers from a state will wear the same outfit or the same color combination. This gives a dancer a sense of belonging, and opportunity to exchange information about each state, and frequently pins that are representations of the state are traded back and forth. (Note: NJ Division of Travel & Tourism makes the NJ pins available free to residents requesting them. Send requests to: NJ Division of Tourism, CN 826, Trenton, NJ 08625.)

Does NJ have a State Outfit? Yes, hence the need for the NNJSDA State

Outfit Coordinators.

Where did the idea come from? Several years ago, NNJSDA dancers at a national square dance convention realized that there was no NJ state outfit. They put in a lot of effort networking with the various regional NJ square dance organizations and designed an outfit that is both practical and flexible. It is not cost-prohibitive, and it is comfortable for dancing. Except for the vest, it can frequently be put together from a basic wardrobe. The colors are Kelly green and white, based on the concept of the "Garden State."

What does it look like? For both dancers, a green vest (with white stitching and a 9" green and white state emblem on the back) is worn over a white shirt or blouse. Either white or green pants or skirts are acceptable. Most skirted dancers wear a white underskirt with a green overskirt/apron trimmed with white eyelet, and this overskirt has the state emblem repeated on it. Also attractive is

an all-white dress worn with the vest.

Some vests and skirts have been made reversible, with the club colors on the inside. This makes a nice raid outfit.

IS YOUR SQUARE DANCE CLUB CREATIVE?

Today, research on social groups and how they operate is as scientific and as much "big business" as industrial fact-finding was some years ago. Many of the findings seem to be just common sense put into words; but some give new insights into our activities.

When we look at what makes a group "creative," we are convinced that square dance clubs need this quality in order to survive. And looking the other 'round at clubs that have continued over the years, we see that they are "creative." As always, there is no way to pinpoint one facet and say, "Doing this will make our club a success." A great deal depends on the attitudes of dancers in the club - having officers who vow to view proposals with an open mind is a big step. Chances are that if every reader takes one suggestion for creative clubs to work on, the quality of square dance organizations everywhere will improve.

We all agree that square dance clubs are formed for the purpose of dancing, and many members shy from being "involved" or serving in an administrative capacity. But we also can see that unless someone steps in to be an officer, or program chairman, or hostess, there will be many nice touches lacking at the dances. So, let's start on the premise that a creative club has the support of its members, and that increased creativity will increase support.

What do we expect from a creative organization? There are several things which we didn't always call creative, sometimes we used the words progressive, or dynamic; at any rate, here they are:

LETTERS TO THE EDITORS...

As 1995 graduates, with student days not far behind touching four clubs over two years, some experiences and ideas are shared here that could provide some useful insights for students, teachers, and clubs.

Classes: The importance of regular class attendance to become a good dancer cannot be overemphasized. Students who miss a class or have class disruptions from holidays feel discouraged and disappointed when they return and can't remember calls they thought they learned previously. A remedy may be to contact a teacher of another club offering classes on a different day of the same week for an OK to attend that class. This tactic would not occur to new students, so would be best encouraged by the teacher or noted in future information for new students. Even if calls are not taught in the same order, the momentum of a weekly class will have been maintained. Such reciprocity, not abused, will benefit the learning process. Students who can afford a second (concurrent) class and have the time will find their progress greatly enhanced by better retention from more repetition, fewer breakdowns and quicker recoveries, and measurably greater self-confidence. Doubling up on classes may even provide graduation insurance. In the winter of 1994, one club experienced five consecutive class cancellations due to several snowstorms and graduated no students that year.

Workshops: Workshops are another means to give students added experience or extra help. One club invited students nearing graduation to a half-hour workshop prior to their regular club dance, after which the students were free to leave or stay, as they wished. This practice offered a most welcome second night of class per week and, for those who stayed, an opportunity to respond to the call, "One more couple to fill a square." Second, there is an

THANKS FOR THE GIFT OF THE DANCING SHOES MABEL BUT WHY THE TWO LEFT SHOES?




In the last column, we wrote that a sleeve without elastic does not allow us to hold a hanky, and several of you noted that if square dance skirts had pockets, that wouldn't be a problem. So, what keeps us from putting pockets in our skirts? You can always put them in the skirts you will make after today, but what about your favorite "old" skirts? Like everything else, it depends on time and know-how. Thanks to Barbara Thoma (Ocean Waves), we can supply the know-how. Barbara commented that we probably only need one pocket per skirt; you can decide whether you want it on


the right or left. The time required for a single pocket "retro-fit" is less than half an hour (the first will take a little longer, of course).

Can you spare that to cure an annoyance?

Start by selecting 2 pieces of light-weight batiste or broadcloth fabric about 13" x 7". It does not have to be the same color as the skirt, but should be lighter than the skirt-darker colors will show a shadow. Either copy the design here or use a pocket piece from a skirt/dress pattern. The actual size is not so important, but the square top is important, so do draw one with that 4" top edge. If a deeper pocket is desired, draw the curve down more, but leave the side edge no longer than 9"; this will leave a 7" finished opening, and a longer opening will gape.



Decide which is the back of the skirt; most square dance skirts are the same all around, so the back can be chosen at random. However, choose it so there is a seam of some nature on the side you wish the pocket to be--either a gore or the seam in the top tier. (You can cut an opening if there is no seam, but it is much easier to let the skirt design work for you. The very nicest thing about this retro-fit is that we are working with a full skirt that will hide almost anything we do to it.) Then on the <u>inside</u> band, mark the center back with a big "X" with a water-proof marker.



Carefully open the side seam from 1/2" below the waistband about 10", 1" longer than the side edge of the pocket piece (do not open the waistband.) Lay the long straight edge of one pocket piece over the opening, right sides together; overlay the pocket top 1/2" above the lower waistband edge. Sew it in place between the dots, starting 1" from the top and stopping 1" from the bottom. Press the seam toward the pocket; on the pocket side, top-stitch through pocket and seam allowance 1/16" from the fold, again leaving the top and bottom 1" free. Repeat with the second pocket piece. Now fold right sides together, and sew around the pocket to the bottom of the waistband; this closes the top and bottom opening in the side seam. Finally, sew the top of the pocket to the bottom of the waistband (be sure to "aim" the pocket toward the front of the skirt); this final step will keep the pocket from gaping and dragging.

If you would like to <u>see</u> this pocket, it will be demonstrated by Barbara at the free Sewing Circle Sewinars at the NJ State Convention on April 20. She is one of the several people who will be presenting sewing ideas, tips, and how-to's that day. Look for us there.

Remember, a SEWING CIRCLE is just a big zero until it is shared -- and SQUARED.

THE TEN-COUPLE SOLUTION

by Dick Mazziotti, Caller/Teacher

Over the past several fortnights, I have collected dancer comments about (think echo sound), "What is wrong with square dancing?!!" The comments generally fall into one or more of the following categories: Callers call too (pick one): fast, slow, complicated, uninteresting. Clubs are too (pick as many as you want): self-centered, old, inactive, social, snooty. Classes are too (pick all): long, complicated, uninteresting, and have too many or not enough angels. Clubs are closing down, dances are not well attended, and finger pointing is being raised to a fine art.

But I can let you in on a secret. I know (the echo-sound again) The Real

Problem....AND...The Real Solution.


In a few words, The Problem = Lack of New Dancers. The Solution = Get New Dancers. This is not simplistic nonsense. Just think, without new dancers entering the system each year, NONE OF THE SOLUTIONS WILL WORK. With lots of new dancers entering the activity, NONE OF THE PROBLEMS ARE REAL. So matter which finger we point, no matter which program we diddle with, no matter how many line dances we add between tips, nothing works without new dancers coming into the system.

And here is how to get new dancers into the system. Let's say every one of the 35 clubs in the NNJSDA brought in 10 couples next year. Let's say we ham-fisted callers managed to blow away half those dancers by the end of the class season. We would still be adding 44 squares of new dancers!!! That's

right, 44 squares!

But most clubs don't have classes. That lack does not relieve them of the responsibility to provide 10 couples of new dancers to one of the clubs that

does have classes. Any and every club that fails to provide 10 couples at the beginning of the class season is draining the activity, taking but not giving. This applies to every Mainstream, Plus, Advanced, and Challenge group.

Right now, only a few of the Mainstream clubs, and one or two Plus clubs, make any concerted effort to bring in students. Every club needs to make that effort if we are to grow strong and healthy again. Club leadership has to recognize that the few Mainstream classes left cannot support any program of

dancing that simply takes unless given more students.

But think of 44 squares of new dancers. Think of an NNJSDA student dance with 44 squares of new dancers, not counting the angels. Think of the problems the NNJSDA would have in finding a hall. Let's all work together to give the NNJSDA this problem. Can your club bring 10 couples to one of the Mainstream classes? Is your club leadership strong enough to recognize the remedy that will make the NNJSDA area once again strong in this activity?


Club leadership needs to recognize that even if the problem does not appear to effect you yet, it will. Some clubs seem to feel that they have the knack of attracting dancers from other programs so they do not have to worry about this problem of new dancers. Club membership needs to work with and on club leadership to provide a positive recruitment program. Mainstream clubs with classes will be more than willing to allow any club that brings in 10 couples and angels with them to graduate those new dancers as members of the recruiting club. If any Mainstream club without a class, or any Plus, Advanced, or Challenge group wants to discuss details of handling for the 10 couples you

LIVE TEN YEARS LONGER!

Square dancing will add ten years to your life, a surprising new study shows. Dr. Arron Blackburn states, "It's clear that square dancing is the perfect exercise. It combines all the positive aspects of intense physical activity with none of the negative elements."

Dr. Blackburn said square dancing is a low-impact activity requiring constant movement and quick directional changes that help keep the body in shape. The study was based on their physical examinations, which indicated that both female

and male square dancers could expect to live well into their 80s.

The square dance movements raise the heart rate like any good aerobic exercise should. All the quick changes of direction loosen and tone up the muscles, but not so severely as to cause injury. In square dancing, when you're not moving, you're clapping hands or tapping feet, which all contributes to longterm fitness.

"You don't see a lot of 55-year-old basketball players, but that's just the age when square dancers are hitting their peak," he said.







DON'T GET CAUGHT IN A SPEED TRAP

by the late Jack Lasry, former Callerlab Chairman of the Board

As we travel to and from our square dances, many of us are keenly aware of the conditions of the road and also aware of the potential speed traps. Now this article is not designed to preach to you about how you drive except to say that we wish you to be careful, since we hate to lose dancers. However, I ask you to consider the similarities or the conditions of the road for automobiles and the

square dance activity.

When we look at square dancing, we see that many of us got our learner's permit when we first attended beginner's classes. We received our driver's license when we "graduated" from class. We traveled down the square dance highway by visiting other clubs, and we had many opportunities to get the small parking violations, etc. when we would goof a call or two. We made new friends and several of them had been "driving" longer than we had and they were showing us the thrills of some of the more scenic drives, and perhaps even high-speed driving. We accepted the bait and we began our own brand of experimentation.

We began driving faster and faster by learning more and more calls from more and more lists. We could handle anything that our local "official" could toss at us. We had "mastered" Mainstream lists, the Quarterly Sections, and the Plus list. True, we had occasional warning signs, perhaps even a flat tire or a blowout, but we were undaunted. We still wanted to go faster and achieve more thrills. Along came a "Superhighway" called "Advanced" and beyond that the very

limited access road called "Challenge."

Many of you (dancers and callers) are really caught up in this speed trap. We sometimes think that because the road is there, we must drive on it. Might not it be better of if we, as individuals, learned to handle the various road conditions along the way? Do we have to travel on the divided highway? Must we pass

everyone on the road?

We talk about the scenic highways and byways and yet in square dancing the scenic portions have to be the people and the friendships established. Just as the forest, the flowers, and the shrubs are the scenic roadside attractions, and the waterfalls add serenity, so do the friendships and people in square dancing accomplish the same things for us in our pursuit of this leisure-time activity. We should take the time to enhance these friendships. We should take the time to smell the roses. We should make the effort to be especially friendly to the strangers who attend our club dances. We should enjoy the scenic route for what it has to offer.

Let us all take stock of ourselves and review where we are and where we would like to go. Let us not get caught up in the "Speed Trap" of square dancing.

obvious time gap between April graduation and summer dances when graduating students could be offered half-hour workshops before their regular dances. This could be extended into summer dances if warranted. For the graduate with

shaky skills, this supplement might well prevent their dropping out.


Student Dances: With the help of angels, this "coming out" is the best skill and morale builder for students. Mainstream's major problems are: (1) its length, and (2) a student's being "shut out" of a club's normal activities until graduation just as the season begins to wind down. Solutions: (1) the December debut of M&M Basic Club may be the answer to a shorter course that, in addition, could pick up some who have stopped dancing. (2) Student dances amount to "specials," outside a club's normal routine. The Student Dance Calendar in the centerfold of the Holiday and Winter Issues of Grand Square is a real service to students. However, in the weeks when no student dances are scheduled, students could become active club participants if a 2x2 Basic/Mainstream dance format were adopted until graduation. These students would dance twice a week, at their regular class and either at student dance or a club dance. Students would become more aware of club support, strengthen their skills and their club association.

Publicity: Local cable TV stations are constantly seeking good program material. Square dancing qualifies. Tapes made at club dances, festivals, and conventions would provide welcome local publicity for our little-known activity and a visual demonstration of people having fun. This could be copied for use as a student recruiting aid. Also, clubs could request summer reruns of the station when they are actively recruiting. Third, a station will make graphic announcements of club activities on request. How about posting on the Internet?

Student Information: The information in the Fall Issue of Grand Square

"1995-96 Beginner Square Dance Classes" on pages 7 & 8 is excellent. It should be more widely available in the future in the form of a flyer to all clubs and class students alike. Important information is missing however, (a) length of classes. September to ? and, in particular, (b) whether the course is 1 or 2 semesters. People do make plans and don't like surprises. On the assumption Mainstream was one semester, in common with the usual adult education course, we made a 2nd semester winter travel commitment that caused the loss of an entire year. which had to be repeated. The reprinting of the Fall Issue cover as a recruiting poster not available until August, from a contest closing in mid-July, is probably superfluous to most clubs, which have much earlier prepared their own flyers. One club held a recruiting barn dance as early in 1995 as the last week in June, so flyers were necessarily prepared in May.

Graduates who anytime expect to be dancing outside their region should be aware of the Century Club booklet (to record 100 callers' signatures) and the National (& International) Square Dance Directory. This Directory lists about 10,000 clubs by state and country, then by city listing the clubs by name, type and program of dancing, location, day of the month and weeks dancing, and the contact's name, address, and phone number for information. The Century Club book costs about \$4.00 and the National Directory about \$9.00, and are available from vendors at conventions, e.g., the NJ State Square & Round Dance

Convention in Ewing, NJ, and possibly some teachers.

Recognition: Most people appreciate recognition for something accomplished. Grand Square notes the names of those receiving Freeloader dangles. Why not the names of Graduates?

The foregoing is presented as food for thought to stimulate discussion, with the hope benefits would accrue to those concerned. Square up. Let's dance? Jim & Catherine Douglas, Bloomfield, NJ

First, we expect creative groups to attract active recruits as members.

Second, a creative organization will produce income, over and above the average. Translated to terms of a square dance club, this means a healthy treasury built by attendance close to capacity at regular as well as special dances. The attendance figures are built by dancers, who are made to feel welcome at dances, who enjoy a variety of programs and callers, and who find the members of the creative group fun to be with. These latter reasons are the third things we expect from a creative group - something worthwhile to offer individuals and the community. In our generation, good, healthy recreation is a definite asset to any community - a benefit we overlook in considering individual dancers in a club.

Creative people, and remember we are encouraging club officers to be or become this type, are decision makers who are aware of the consequences of each decision; are long-range planners; can see beyond obvious solutions to immediate problems; can examine practices and habits, continuing good ones and discarding others. In doing these things, they take certain risks for the group. First, they risk money - for a special caller's fee, or a hall, or flyers, or decorations, or refreshments - any of the things that make a square dance a gala occasion. Second, they risk the time to do a number of things - to plan, to listen to others, to allow people to contribute to the club and its projects. Third, they risk self-examination and criticism by others. Anyone who shoulders responsibility may be blamed for decisions, but will be able to see the future goal for which the decision was made, and stand firm on the ground.

Clubs look over their programs and aims, and then decide what kind of group



What is the gold star on the emblem for? Each dancer attaches an embroidered gold star on the state emblem at the location of his/her home club. Where do I get these outfits? We have patterns available for both buttoned and unbuttoned vest, and overskirts. We also have available white and green polycotton broadcloth fabric at cost. The emblems are made in a green zig-zag outline on white broadcloth, and the NJ pattern, initials, and gold star are available as well.

"I can sew, but I would never try to zig-zag the state outline!" You are not alone! That is why we have had the emblems pre-embroidered and they are now available complete with initials and stars as a kit. They may be sewn on (straight stitch by hand), ironed on with fusible web, or attached with permanent fabric glue (available at most sewing, craft, or dime stores).

THE FUTURE OF SQUARE DANCING

Among the resolutions passed at the Legacy meeting in 1995, one concerning the "Future of Square Dancing" arose from concern over the need to acquaint youth and young adults with the fun of square dancing. A two-year

task force reported on its findings at the meeting, noting that where youth clubs exist, they are strong because of the support they receive from their callers (a parent or young friend) and from parents. In many areas no opportunity to dance exists for young people. A few clubs allow younger dancers to join, but the published list is very limited. This first resolution reads:

Whereas, the future of the square dance activity lies in our children from

Kindergarten through the University level; and,

Whereas, there are now excellent instructional materials available, such as Jack Murtha's Diamond Program, which enable educators to teach square dancing in the schools in the correct way with proper attitudes; and

Whereas, there is considerable square dance curriculum material already developed, or in development for which no financing is available, be it resolved:

That Legacy International take the initiative in working with other square dance organizations to obtain financing for the production of additional instructional square dance materials for us in the schools, K through 12, and other youth educational or recreational organizations.

Many present square dancers bemoan the lack of younger dancers entering the picture. The question that must be answered is, "How anxious are we to have younger dancers in our groups?" Will we bend our dress code, adjust our


times, offer baby sitting?

LONG-TIME DANCE CALLER RETIRING

Put a microphone in Al Brundage's hand and, ready or not, the square dance reels spill out of his mouth. From the first do-si-do to the last square-thru, Brundage's 62 years as square dance caller have left a deep mark on square dancing culture. The Port St. Lucie (FL) man has written books, recorded albums and led countless tour groups dancing around the world. He announced his retirement last month, and nearly 300 of his followers are expected to converge in a tribute to Brundage's career.

Brundage's influence has stretched from a schoolhouse in Danbury, CT, to the top of The Great Wall of China. His world map is thickly scattered with pins marking where he's taken his dance groups. Unbeknownst to most Americans, he said, the uniquely U.S. dance has turned up in halls in Scandinavia, Iceland, Egypt, Kenya, China, Japan, and throughout the Caribbean and Mediterranean.

To promote the dance further, Brundage started Callerlab.

Brundage started out in 1934 by calling for the local 4-H club in Danbury when the boy who usually called out the steps left town. Reflecting on the popularity of square dancing over the years, he says the dance has gone in and out of cycles. It was a big hit in the '40s and '50s, but in the '80s and '90s it has been waning. He predicts that there will be a resurgence, however, near the turn of the century. The popularity of country two-step and line dancing will probably lead to square dancing - a more complicated form of those dances, he said.

Listen to the endless stories of the people he has met, the other dances he has learned from different cultures during his travels, and the smile on his face shows that his long career has been a good one. "I have thousands and thousands of pleasurable memories and plenty of friends across the world, and I think that adds up to a successful program."






