### NEW OFFICERS ELECTED FOR 1960-61

At the Annual Delegates Meeting held on April 3rd, the new slate of officers for the 1960-61 season was presented and unanimously approved by the members present. The newly elected officers will officially take over on Sept. 1st. We would like to officially introduce them to you—giving a brief accounting of their square dance activities.



BOB KECK, PRESIDENT, and his wife Terry, live at 8 Stiles Rd., Edison, N. J. Bob and Terry were on the original organizing committee of NNJSDA which was formed in the fall of 1957. Since then, Bob has served as vice president of the Association for two years. He has handled publicity and advertising and designed the official Association insignia. Bob designed and published the first copy of GRAND SQUARE and since then has directed the publication as editorin-chief. He served on many committees including beginners planning. Bob and Terry's "home" club is Metuchen Country Promenaders for which Bob served as president during 1958-59 and Terry as secretary during 1955-56.



BUD SIBBALD, VICE PRESIDENT, and his wife Betty, live at 985 Soldier Hill Rd. in Oradell, N. J. They have been square dancing for four years and belong to the Valley Steppers Round Dance Club, Metuchen Square Dance Club, Belles & Beaux Square Dance Club, and Hilltop Squares. During their years of square dancing, the Sibbalds have found time to be secretary of the Belles & Beaux, president of the Valley Steppers Round Dance Club, and have worked on publicity for the Association in Bergen-Passaic counties.

MAE SCHREIBER, SECRETARY, and her husband Fred, live at 14 Frances Rd., in Metuchen, N. J. They graduated from the Association's Plainfield class in 1959. Since that time they have joined the Metuchen Country Promenaders, Westfield Lincoln Squares, and the Metuchen Square Dance Club. In March of this year, they attended the Washington Spring Festival. At the present time, Mae holds the office of secretary for the Metuchen Country Promenaders.

#### BEHIND THE MIKE




The graduation Class of 1960A is now history and its members have dispersed -- diplomas in hand -- to swell the ranks of our local clubs, this

Many of our clubs will also have summer dancing programs and you will probably soon be receiving notices about these.


#### HIGHLIGHTS OF THE ANNUAL DELEGATES MEETING


