BEGINNERS CLASSES



PLAINFIELD - Seventeen couples were enrolled in the beginner classes held under the combined auspices of the Association and the Plainfield Evening School. The fall classes were again held on Monday evenings with Al Aderente doing the instruction. While this was not the largest class, it surely was one of the most enthusiastic. The enthusiasm was evidenced by the fact that the group on their own initiative organized weekly workshops of one or two squares between lessons which are continuing. Clubs in the area are certain to gain new good dancing members from this group. The advanced class will begin in January. Registration will be on Monday, January 14 and class will start on Monday, January 21 running for 10 consecutive weeks with John Carroll instructing.

TENAFLY - NNJSDA directed classes in Tenafly are held in the Mackay School. The 10-session beginners course was concluded on December 12 with thirteen couples having gotten "basic" instruction from Marty Winter. Organizational duties and refreshments were handled by Jim and Alma Mitchell and George and Billie Milton. The 10-lesson advanced course will get underway on January 9th with Jim Flammer at the mike.

SOMERSET HILLS - Association directed a class of 6 squares at Somerset Hills which concluded its initial series of 10 lessons on Wednesday, December 12th at Bernardsville High School. Callers were Vin Caruso and Ernie Lens. Registrations are now being taken for the advanced class which will begin on January 16th with Al Aderente and Vin Caruso calling. Jack DeCoste is the course chairman.

ALLIED CHEMICAL - Two and a half squares completed the Allied Chemical Co. class in December with Lloyd Siewers instructing. The advanced course is already underway with Wednesday sessions being instructed by Lloyd. Also, tentatively, Vin Caruso will direct some of the advanced sessions. Parker and Dawn Johnson (President of Allied Squares) are chairmen for the course.

WESTFIELD - An NNJSDA cooperative effort with the Westfield YMCA gets underway on January 25th when a beginners class of 10 sessions will get started. Classes will be on Fridays from 8:30 to 10:30 P. M. and Bob Kellogg will instruct the series. Three sets have already registered. This is the first mid-year class for several years.

HIGHLIGHTS OF OTHER BEGINNER GROUPS

1. Tenakill Twirlers are turning out another group of new dancers at classes instructed by the Brombergs in their basement. The Brombergs have turned out a new group of dancers every year since 1955.
2. In Demarest, N. J., a group of new couples are being indoctrinated in square dance basics through the efforts of the LaRues, Bargs, Kloocks, and Nasons. Ralph Nason has been calling with assistance from Dawn Kloock.
3. The Merri-Eights course being conducted under the sponsorship of the East Brunswick Adult Education Program completed 10 lessons with 2-3 squares instructed by Ernie Lens. The course was concluded on December 3rd with a party dance complete with refreshments. The advanced session starts on January 24th (Mondays) and Beulah Samec will instruct.
4. The Richmond Dancers (Staten Island) sponsored beginners class was concluded in December with fourteen couples completing the course under the tutelage of Beulah Samec. The second half or advanced course is already underway.
5. Another class consisting of eight couples was recruited from the Menlo Park Terrace area in Woodbridge by the M T Squares and is nearing the mid-point of the Association's recommended 20-lesson course. Course Chairman is Mrs. Carmella Tampkins and instructor is Barney Hartenstein.

(Editor's note: The above represents a total of approximately 125 couples (31 squares) and without doubt there are many other couples getting instructions at groups which have not come to our attention.)

FROM BEHIND THE MIKE — — — WHAT IS SQUARE DANCING?



From where I stand only ONE word can describe Square Dancing and that word is FUN.

There are four very IMPORTANT aspects in the Square Dance movement:

1. Square Dance Club.
2. New Square Dancers.
3. Experienced Club Members.
4. Your Local Caller.

Individually they don't mean too much; however, united and in harmony they spell out a very healthy activity — — a GOAL which I am certain we are all trying to REACH. In order to guarantee the growth of this movement, we should all read and keep in mind these TIPS for better Square Dancing.

A SQUARE DANCE CLUB is an organization for the purpose of having and promoting club type dancing. An executive committee does their bit to keep the club running smoothly and at the same time attempts to assure the dancers a good time. This committee is composed of members who are willing to give extra time to the sometimes thankless job of planning club activities. It isn't possible to please everyone all the time, so if you don't agree with something just remember they are trying their best for the club as a whole and need everyone's support. Be loyal. You may be part of the committee next year.

NEW SQUARE DANCERS should get on the floor as soon as the music starts. If you wait until another couple asks you to join them you might end up a spectator instead of a participant, and remember a new dancer will learn much more by dancing in a square with two or more experienced couples. Don't worry if you goof. Everyone was once a beginner. Try not to get flustered if you make a mistake. Recovering quickly is far more important than the mistake itself.

EXPERIENCED CLUB MEMBERS should try to do their best to welcome new dancers. Mix with them, being careful that you don't unintentionally act disgusted with their mistakes. New members are trying so hard and consequently get flustered and goof all the more. Unhappy new members are a poor advertisement for the Square Dance activity because they influence their friends.

YOUR LOCAL CALLER attempts to help everyone enjoy himself at the dances. Even though you don't think you need a walk through the caller can see the floor better than you and it might help a couple right in your square. If you like a particular call or enjoyed the dance, please tell the caller. He likes to know he is appreciated. Remember, he is an important part of the club, too. If you're enjoying yourself, applaud like mad! Don't forget to include the caller's wife in some of the dances. She likes to visit and dance with all of you.

Remember, Square Dancing is FUN — so let's keep it that way.

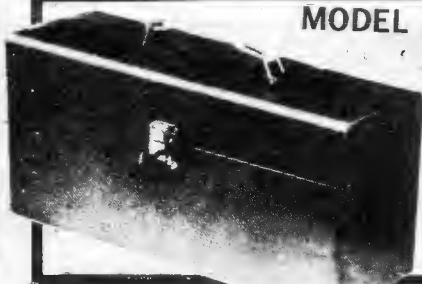

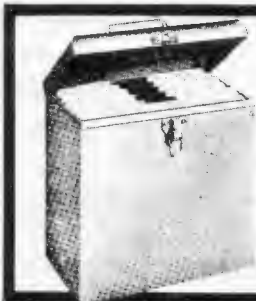
